Possible Ectopic (Tubal) Pregnancy



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What is an ectopic (tubal) pregnancy?

- An ectopic pregnancy is when a fertilized egg attaches outside of the uterus. This is also called a tubal pregnancy because the egg often implants in 1 of the fallopian tubes. As the fertilized egg grows, it stretches the fallopian tube. This can cause the fallopian tube to rupture (break).
- It is important that an ectopic pregnancy is found early. It can be life-threatening if it is not treated.
- About 1 to 2% of all pregnancies are ectopic.

Why do I need to be tested for an ectopic pregnancy?

- Your health care provider may test you for an ectopic pregnancy if they cannot find the embryo or fetus. This may happen when you have a positive pregnancy test, but the embryo or fetus does not show in your uterus on an ultrasound.
- Ectopic pregnancies are rare. It is more likely that your pregnancy is just very early and hard to find.

How is the test done?

- You will need 2 blood tests to check your pregnancy hormone level:
 - The first test will be on the day of your ultrasound and/or abortion.
 - The second test will be done 2 days later. This is to make sure your pregnancy hormone level has gone down.
- You may also need a second ultrasound.

While you are waiting for your test results:

Call 911 or go to the nearest Emergency Department right away if you have:

- Very bad, sharp lower abdominal (stomach) pain. This sudden pain is usually on 1 side more than the other.
- Pain that goes up to your shoulder or under your rib cage, especially when lying down
- > Bleeding from your vagina
- Tell staff that you are being tested for an ectopic pregnancy.
- Do not call the ROSE clinic. You need to get help right away.

How will I get my test results?

A doctor or a nurse from the ROSE Clinic will call you with your test results. They will talk with you about any follow-up you may need.
