# Welcome to the Rheumatology Clinic

- Rheumatic diseases can cause:
  - › painful inflammation (swelling) › pain in your muscles, joints, or tissue
- Some rheumatic diseases can also affect your organs.
- Rheumatic diseases affect each person differently. Your health care team will work with you to decide which treatment is best for you.

## Your health care team includes:

- › Your primary health care provider (family doctor)
- › A rheumatologist (a doctor with special training in rheumatic [inflammatory] disease)
- › Medical students
- › Residents
- › Registered Nurses (RNs)
- › Licensed Practical Nurses (LPNs)
- › Other clinic staff

### **If you need to cancel your appointment:**

- › Call 902-473-4161 at least 48 hours (2 days) before your appointment.
- › If you miss an appointment and did not call to cancel, we will not automatically rebook your appointment. You will get your new appointment date and time by mail 4 to 6 weeks before the appointment.
- **Try to be on time for your appointment, and cancel only if needed. This is very important.** It helps us plan your care and the care of other patients.

- **The Rheumatology Clinic does not provide primary health care.** Please see your primary health care provider for any other health concerns. They can contact your rheumatologist as needed.
- You may be asked if you would like to take part in a clinical research project. You do not have to. You will have the same care whether or not you choose to take part.

### **Before your visit**

- Ask your pharmacist if any of the medications your rheumatologist prescribed need to be refilled.
  - › Bring a list of these medications with you to your appointment.
  - › Ask your rheumatologist for prescriptions for these medications during your appointment.
- Bring a list of all the medications you take (including over-the-counter medications, vitamins, supplements, and herbal products).
- For each medication, include:
  - › The name
  - › The dose (amount) you take
  - › How often you take it

- Plan to arrive 15 to 20 minutes early to find parking and register for your appointment.

### **During your visit**

- Ask your rheumatologist for any test results.  
**Test results are not given over the phone.**
- Be honest with your team. This is important so we can find the best ways to help you feel as well as possible. Talk with your health care team about:
  - › how you are feeling.
  - › your symptoms.
  - › how you take your medications.
- A nurse may call before or after your appointment to give you information about your condition.
- A nurse may call to teach you about your medication if:
  - › this is your first visit to the clinic.
  - › you have received a new diagnosis.
  - › you have started a new medication.
- Call the Rheumatology Clinic at 902-473-4161 if you need any of the following:
  - › Book, change, or cancel an appointment
  - › A new blood collection form
  - › Confirm your appointment

- › Check on the status of your referral (find out when you will be seen by a rheumatologist)
- › Talk to a nurse about your rheumatology condition
- A recorded message will list these options and tell you which button to press.

### **Please note:**

- If you call the clinic to change an appointment, we may not call you back.
  - › We will send you a new appointment time in the mail. This may take 2 to 3 weeks.
  - › We will offer you the next available appointment, but please keep in mind that availability may be limited.
- If you call the clinic for a new lab requisition, we will send it to you in the mail.
- If you do not get your requisition after 3 weeks:
  - › Call 902-473-4161.
  - › Listen to the recording and press the button for your rheumatologist's team (team A or team B).
  - › Leave a voicemail telling your team that you have not received your requisition.
